

Councillor Sarah Clarke, Chairman of Pembury Parish Council, Councillor Alison Morton, Vice Chairman of the Public Relations Group and Mrs Barbara Russell, Clerk to the Parish Council, were welcomed to the school by Mrs Christina Lundberg, Deputy Headteacher and by Peter Vaughan, the Chairman of the Governors.

The special occasion was to mark the presentation to each girl and boy at the school with a Pembury 2000 mug. Representatives from each class - a girl and a boy - were greeted by Gouncillor Mrs Clarke and each presented with a mug. They also received a huge cardboard box containing all the mugs for the rest of their class!

Councillor Mrs Clarke explained the significance of the Millennium and asked the children to make a Millennium wish each, to write it down and send it via their class teacher and Mrs Lundberg to Councillor Mrs

On 9 January 2000 the Village Millennium Service held at Pembury School brought together Christians from all denominations to celebrate the new Millennium.

The Millennium photographic project got underway; St Peter's Photographic Club drew up their schedules and the Parish Council Public Relations Working Group extended an invitation to everybody in Pembury to send in photos of people enjoying events throughout the year.

The Parish Council decided to take part in the Kent Millennium Databox archive project which aimed to record a snapshot of life in Kentish villages between 17 and 24 April 2000. Information about everyday life and individuals was needed and would be stored for the future in a special archive in Maidstone.

MARCH/APRIL 2000

Early Spring in Pembury

April saw a Taizé service take place at St Peter's Upper Church and these services have now become a regular feature of worship at the Upper Church.

Taizé is an interdenominational Christian community established near Cluny in France in 1949 and has attracted hundreds of thousands



of young people (in particular) who go to spend a week singing, praying and sharing their faith with others. Taizé services are distinctive by their use of candlelight, the repeated meditative choruses and chants and the use of silence. A beautifully decorated church adds to the atmosphere in which one can make time to be with God.

The Parish Council held its Annual Parish Meeting, open to all residents of Pembury on 20 March.

The Databox project, giving a snapshot of Pembury life in early 2000, was completed and the box went to the Maidstone archive.

Millennium Maypole Dancing

Maypole Dancing is comprised of several ceremonial folk dances performed around a tall pole garlanded with greenery or flowers and hung with ribbons which are woven into complex patterns by the dancers. They are survivals of ancient dances typically performed on 1st May of each year. The tradition was part of rural life for many centuries but then died out during the war years.

Mrs Beynon, the wife of the head teacher at Pembury School revived the tradition in the 1950s. In the late 1970s the Parish Council organised a local May Queen competition and in 1978 the school country dancers were invited to perform. However, the May Queen event was not widely supported so the schoolchildren asked if they would choose their own Queen of the May.

In 1981 Pembury School held its first Maypole ceremony on the upper green and since those early years successive teams of dancers have been trained by their country dance teachers.

The maypole has 24 ribbons for plaiting and this demands great concentration and teamwork by children who have adapted the patterns over the years. The country dancing club is open to all children from Year 4 upwards and is held weekly throughout the year. The children themselves vote for the May Queen and her attendants.

The staff and pupils of Pembury School consider it an honour to keep this tradition alive and feel that it is a way of 'giving back' to the village that supports them so much throughout the year.

The Grand Reunion at Pembury School on 6th May was hailed as a resounding success by all who took part. The school hall was filled with former pupils and staff of every age group. Two hundred and forty entries were made in the Millennium Book.

The eldest visitor was a gentleman who attended the school from 1911 to 1915. He still lives in the village and plays bowls regularly. Another former pupil, aged 83, came on the bus from Tonbridge. He had attended school in1926 and had lived in the boys' home which was in Romford Road. This piece of information led to further research as everyone wanted to know where the home was actually situated. Later in the day the mystery was solved by another former pupil who had written a piece about life as a boy in Pembury eighty years ago. Chalfonts, as the home was called, was along a small track in the first part of Romford Road nearest to the village. The house is now two homes.

It was delightful to see so many people who told us some wonderful stories of life in school. The information we gathered will be a rich source for the children. Many former pupils have offered to come into school to talk to the children which is something we will look forward to following up.

During the day people were able to wander around the school revisiting their old classrooms and reminiscing about the good old days! Many former pupils met up with old friends again and were able to exchange news and memories.

Our thanks go to everyone who came and made it such a successful day.


and who were believed to have conducted worship in Pembury Old Church in medieval times, linked the various 'playlets'.

As always, the arena events went well and provided the various organisations with the opportunity to show what activities are on offer to the youth of the village.






The End of the Year
