

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# Comment

Following up on the article in the last issue of this Magazine, it is understood that the Local Plan will be considered by the Tunbridge Wells Borough Council during the next session. Pembury Parish Council intend to be vociferous in trying to obtain the best for Pembury. It is of paramount importance that the Green Belt, which has been drawn so tightly around Pembury, is formally adopted as soon as possible. Better village amenity facilities will be sought and a reduction in development and infilling within Pembury will be campaigned for.

The Parish Council also has strong views on the "fresh" Local Government Review for Kent which concerns Gillingham, Rochester -upon- Medway, Dartford and Gravesham. If these four areas are turned into two unitary authorities there will be massive repercussions on the County of Kent, especially regarding Local Government. Your Parish Council wish to

see the retention of the present two-tier system in Kent in order to preserve the present infrastructures, particularly with regard to education and social services.

Nearer home, as mentioned in "Your Clerk Reports" we are all concerned about the increase of anti-social behaviour, particularly violence, vandalism, drunkenness and intimidation in Pembury. It is hoped that the new Police initiative Community Policing will be one way to try to eradicate these problems.

# GILL'S GARDEN

Autumn is here again and it is time to look at the gaps in the borders now that the summer bedding plants have finished. After forking the soil and adding bonemeal, spring bedding such as wallflowers, polyanthus, forget-meknots and pansies can be planted.

In addition to plants, spring flowering bulbs should be planted in the autumn. Beds of snowdrops, crocus, muscari, along with aconites, can give a beautiful early spring display especially if interspersed with winter and spring flowering ericas. They need not be confined to flower beds but can be planted into pots and troughs.

Plants in herbaceous borders that have finished flowering can be cut down and divided if necessary: when replanting add some bonemeal to the soil first. Sweet peas can be planted at this time along with hardy annuals such as godetia, larkspur, alyssum, cornflowers and candytuft for an early display.

Plant trees and shrubs if the soil is not frozen or waterlogged: evergreen shrubs can be planted in October or March. New roses can be planted from now on until April and established roses should be pruned back by half in the autumn to prevent gale damage.

The autumn will see the final cut of the lawn followed by aerating and a dressing of equal parts leaf mould and sand. All fallen leaves should be removed and any hollows can be levelled by removing the turf and filling the hollow with soil before replacing. Don't forget that the final cut should not be too low because of possible frost damage.

A few bulbs planted now in indoor bowls will be ready in time for Christmas.

# **Pembury School**

Sadly this year, the School have had to refuse to take some children who live in the village. I therefore thought it would be helpful to take this opportunity to explain the procedures for the allocation of places at Pembury School because of the

school.

The Governors and I have taken the view that we will try to ensure that there is a maximum of 32 children in a class. We have to balance the needs of the children who wish to come in with those who are already in the

When there are more applications than there are places available, the County Criteria for Admissions has to come into operation. The most important criteria is that brothers and sisters get places in the same school and the next important criteria is nearness of children's homes and ease of access to the school. Two things that do not affect the decision are how soon you register your child at the school or sending your child to the inhouse nursery is no guarantee of a place at the school. It assists us with forward planning, however, if parents can register their children at school 18 months to 2 years before they are due to start.



This coming term in the two
Reception classes the older children
(who have their fifth birthday between
1st September and Easter) will be
starting in September and during that
term there will be 17 children in each
class. In January another 15 children
join the class. During their first half
term at school all Reception children
will attend school for mornings only. I
anticipate that a similar pattern will be
followed in future years.

Should parents wish to view the school, and I always advise parents to look around schools before their children start school, they are welcome to make an appointment to do so.

Having now completed my first academic year at Pembury School, I have appreciated the warm welcome that I have been given by children, staff, parents and governors.

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# Profile

As we are commemorating this year the 50th Anniversary of the end of World War 2, both in Europe and the Far East, it is appropriate that this Profile features the Burma Star veterans living in Pembury. The local Tunbridge Wells and Pembury Branch of the Burma Star Association has 26 members, 4 of whom still live in Pembury. These men and women served in Burma between 1941 and 1945. Burma is a little known country these days, having been ruled by a very strictly military regime for over 40 years. It was a very difficult area in which to fight a campaign; the climate is always very hot and humid and the jungle impassable. The brave men and women who fought the Japanese are so often forgotten, let us now remember them.

Alfred Pimblett M.M., the present Chairman of the local Branch, served in Burma from 1944 to 1945. He was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in action with the Commandos at Kangow in January 1945. This hard fought battle resulted in the Japanese being defeated and was the beginning of the difficult re-conquest of Burma by British, American and Chinese troops.

Arthur Latter, often known as "the grand old man of Pembury" - everybody knew him - died last October. He was proud to have been a Burma Star veteran and it is sad that he did not live to commemorate the 50th Anniversary. He served in the Queens Own Royal West Kent Regiment and fought in the famous Battle of Kohima, a hill town in North East India, about 50 miles from the border with Burma. About 500 men held off attacks from 15,000 Japanese troops for 2 weeks in April 1944. Many men lost their lives, many more were injured but this battle proved to be the turning point of the war and gradually the Japanese were pushed further and further southwards. Bill Brown served in Burma with the East Lancashire Regiment from 1944 to 1945.

His unit formed part of the forces under American command who, with Chine support, fought the Japanese in North East Burma. Bill has carried the Burma Star standard with great dignity and skill on many occasions in Pembury in recent years. Peggy Harris was living in Burma with her family when the War began. She was evacuated to Assam, in North East India, in 1942 but returned to Burma early in 1945 as a nurse where she cared for injured soldiers of many nations including Japanese prisoners of war. She remained in Burma for a while after the war had ended. Peter Down was in the Royal Navy serving in H.M.S. Redoubt, a destroyer which patrolled the Bay of Bengal and escorted troop and supply ships during the Burma Campaign. In January 1945 the Royal Navy played a vital role in the landings along the west coast of Burma when a new offensive was started.

Ron Whitlock, the Hon Secretary of the Association, is an Associate member as he did not serve in Burma. However he was based in India in 1945, was trained and ready to leave for Burma when the war ended. He has collected a great deal of interesting material about the Burma Campaign and tells me that two other Pembury residents, Albert Frank Smith and James Birtchnell, also served in Burma but are not members of the Association. I am most grateful to Ron for the help he gave me in compiling this special Profile.



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
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# NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR

# PEMBURY IN THE PAST

#### BAGGESEN'S GOLD

The article in the last issue about the honeysuckle bush "Baggesen's Gold" created a lot of interest. Villagers have called in with their own stories and Notcutts Garden Centre have written in with well documented evidence. From all sources I have pieced together the story of the Baggesen family and their Nurseries which I feel might create further interest in the telling:-

Niels Immanuel Baggesen came to England from Denmark at the turn of the century and worked as a student at Kew Gardens before starting up a Nursery of his own in Whitchurch, Glamorgan, In the late 1920's he moved to this district with his English wife and family, John, Harald, Mollie and Thelma. Their first house in Pembury was "The Shack" in Romford Road where he started a nursery business on a small piece of land purchased from a local farmer, a Mr. Cooper. Later, in the early 1930's, he moved his nursery to land in the Woodsgate area near to the site of what is now Woodhill Park and had a new house built in Lower Green Road, known as "Viborg". He was joined at the Woodsgate Nursery by his sons John, who organised the growing of stock, and Harald, who specialised more in landscaping. The Woodsgate business flourished on this site and just after the war a Mr. Acton Philips joined the business and Niels Baggesen retired. The Woodsgate Nursery was eventually taken over by Clarks of Dover and then sold on for development. In the meantime Niels had purchased what was to become known as Highfield Nursery which was taken over by his two sons. This Nursery, which had its main entrance on the Hastings Road, extended down covering the area on which Highfield Close now stands. John lived nearby at "Gaskins", Amberlease Drive. It was at this nursery in the very early 1950s that John was excited to discover one day, on a specimen of Lonicera nitida, a young shoot whose tip had golden leaves instead of the usual dark green. Although it measured only an inch or so, he propagated the sport, built up stock and in 1952

exhibited it at a Royal Horticultural Society Show as Lonicera nitida "Baggesen's Gold". This was the second success for John as a few years after the Second World War on a Lawson Cypress - Chamaecyparis lawsoniana - he spotted a sport with dove grey foliage and in 1950 exhibited the young tree at the R H S under the name of Chamaecyparis lawsoniana "Pembury Blue". Not many villages can claim to have a tree named after them, but such is the good fortune of Pembury. Neither exhibits were a commercial success until they were included in the catalogue of Jackmans Nursery of Woking who still have the original Cypress stock plants which are now some 20 feet high. In common with many nurseries in the late '60s, Highfield Nursery struck hard times and eventually closed, the land being sold for development . A rose nursery which he had started in Stonecourt Lane was kept on as a going concern but later it too closed..

Neils Immanuel Baggesen died on the 18th December 1961 at the age of 85 years. Harald died in 1978. John died a batchelor in retirement at Holtye in 1985. Both Mollie and Thelma are still living. The Baggesen connection with Pembury remains: Harald had a son, John, who still lives in Pembury.

#### "PEMBURY MILL" by TURNER

There has always been an element of controversy concerning which of Pembury's two mills the landscape painter Turner did paint. However, a simple enquiry by the Local History Group to the Tate Gallery may have resolved the matter. There are in existence three paintings by Turner entitled "Pembury Mill" held variously at the Tate, The Victoria & Albert Museum and the British Museum.

Two were painted about 1795 and 1796 when Turner was only 20 years old and are clearly of the same place, despite a certain amount of artistic licence. The third picture

was painted some ten years later in about 1807 and even the art experts at the Tate, who did not know we had two mills in Pembury, pointed out that this picture is of a different location.

The simple conclusion was that Turner had, in fact, painted both mills; but which one was which? The site of Keyes Mill ( also known as Herrings Mill ) is on Footpath 222 just beyond Stonecourt Farm. The local History Group went and had a good look around the site and the two earlier pictures seem to fit with the evidence that is still visible. So what of the third picture? Despite earlier thoughts that it was of Keyes Mill it clearly wasn't. The History Group therefore arranged a visit with the present owner of Spring Grove Mill who very kindly explained how the water course had been altered and where the property had been extended in more recent times. With this additional information it was possible to see that this was where the third and more well-known picture was painted.

#### PEMBURY'S HOME GUARD

As D Company, 22nd Battalion (Tunbridge Wells) Kent Home Guard, to give its full title, commenced its duties in 1940 after Dunkirk, the Government asked for Local Defence Volunteers (L.D.V.) During those early days an arm band and a various collection of weapons, liable to cause more damage to the user than the enemy, were the sole amount of equipment. The Volunteers were mainly first world war veterans, plus youngsters awaiting their call-up.

Slowly, uniforms were issued along with great coats, heavy American Winchester .300 rifles plus 25 rounds of ammunition and the title L.D.V. was changed to Home Guard. Conscription of reserved workers resulted in an increase of Home Guard numbers and also an increase of armoury: Mills Grenades, short range anti-tank weapons and Sten guns were issued. These weapons were often cheap, crude and dangerous to use if care was not taken.

Sunday mornings were training days: "square-bashing", to discover how many "two left feet" members we had; weapon training: some members had eye sight problems and were unable to use the weapons; map reading; camouflage; field craft; all important lessons but with little time to become very proficient. Occasionally, we were allowed our turn at the local rifle range at the Castle Hill Range on the way to Tonbridge.

During lighter evenings, barbed wire entanglements were erected around the village running roughly on the line of the present Village Conservation area. Hop poles had already been erected in larger fields throughout the parish to prevent enemy gliders landing. Near to the entrance to the Old Vicarage, Hastings Road, was a so-called tank trap which was in the "line of fire" from the Army Pill Box on the Green – the Band Stand

From the word go, night guard duties were carried out: a team of six to eight members did duty in various parts of the village, changing from time to time: a platform on top of a scaffold and a hut at Colts Hill, a hut in Roughlands Shaw, a garage in a private garden in the Hastings Road, the Pavilion in the Recreation Ground and finally in one of the outbuildings at Altrabreech (Sunhill Court). This was also the Company H.Q. which was previously at the Manor House on the Green. The guard duties were mainly to keep a look out for parachutists but were also the first stage when night emergency 'callouts' were called. Exercises, both day and night, were sometimes organised with the Army. These often ended with bad temper by the Army who discovered that the Home Guard had used unorthodox methods which were not in the book.

As the war in Europe came to an end, the Home Guard was disbanded. All members who had seen service through out this period received a letter from King George V1 thanking them for their services to the Country. Thankfully the Home Guard was never involved in active warfare and, with hindsight, do we realise how close we were to invasion by the Germans?


After six and a half years as the Vicar of Pembury, Jim Brasier is retiring and leaving the Parish on the 15th October.

The Parish Council also has plans to clear and re-plant much of the roundel at St. Peters Upper Church.in the autumn.

At the Parish Council Meeting on 17th July, it was decided not to ban vehicles from the allotment site but it was stressed that the Parish Council do not accept responsibility for any vehicles taken into the allotment site or for any loss and/or damage caused by those vehicles.

The groundsmen have made a start on clearing weeds from untenanted allotments and will continue to do so as their working time permits. It is, however, the responsibility of allotment holders to keep down the weeds on and around their plots. If anyone has rented a plot but has since changed their mind about cultivating it, please let the Clerk's Office know.

# Your Clerk Reports

Since the last issue of this Magazine, the Parish Council has been very busy, especially after the May election, when the new Council had a great deal of new Policy to consider and adopt.

The main concern of Councillors at the moment is the problem of nuisance crimes in Pembury, such as vandalism, drunkenness and intimidation. Inspector Trevor Hall of Kent County Constabulary recently attended a Parish Council Meeting to discuss these and other matters. One of the new initiatives being set up is Community Policing. Our Community PC is PC Chris Janes who will be dealing directly with Neighbourhood Watch groups and other organisations. The Parish Council recently tabled a motion at the Kent Association of Parish Councils' AGM to request a full investigation into the reasons behind the increase in violence etc. which would lead to recommendations

which would reverse the trend.

Mr. Keith Searle, Deputy Chief Executive and Mrs David, Allocations Manager, of the High Weald Housing Association made an informative presentation to the Parish Council. The Council is happy that some of the problems experienced by tenants in Pembury are now on the way to being resolved.

In the Recreation Ground, the Parish Council are in the process of rectifying matters highlighted by a recent safety report on the play equipment. The car park has recently been marked out by a contractor provided by Kent County Council Highways Department: just one example of how different tiers of local government provide support and promote close working relationships with each other.

Many of you who visited the Scouts and Guides Fete in July will have seen the Parish Council's display in the Recreation Ground Pavilion which provided an insight into the responsibilities of the Council and its role in the local community.
